HLAA-TC Zoom Meeting Sep 17, 2022, Minutes by Signe Dysken, Vice President Captions by Megan Stumm, RPR, Paradigm Reporting and Captioning, Inc.

Part 1: Guest speaker

The link to the meeting was opened at 9:30 AM, with informal socialization for 30 minutes. The meeting was called to order at 10:00 AM by the new president, Robin Coninx (Byrdie), who introduced the speaker of the day.

Speaker was Dr. Ed Auer, Associate Professor in the Dept of Speech and Hearing Sciences at George Washington University, who spoke on "Can Training Improve Understanding of Noisy Speech for Listeners with Hearing Loss?" His research areas include multi-sensory speech perception, and spoken word recognition with specific focus on examining the perceptual, cognitive and neural consequences of experience and training.

Dr. Auer reported on an ongoing clinical trial that trains participants to lipread. He emphasized that training does help with understanding of speech in noisy situations. Training consists of 8 sessions, 30 minutes long and does not involve listening, but instead involves training in lipreading. He said that lipreading involves more than simply watching a speaker's lips. Skilled lipreaders observe lip, jaw, cheek and tongue movements to help them to understand speech. He showed a video to demonstrate the observable movements that are involved for detecting various consonants.

Dr. Nicole Jordan, clinical coordinator of audiology at the GW Speech and Hearing Center then spoke about why lipreading is important for those who have hearing aids. Hearing aids do not give a person normal hearing. Often, in programming hearing aids, audiologists fit the hearing aids to optimize audibility while still optimizing comfort. High pitches are often decreased to optimize naturalization of sounds, although this also decreases clarity in some of the softer, higher pitched sounds like s, th, sh, p and f.

Because of the deficiencies that continue even with hearing aids and cochlear implants, hearing speech with surrounding noise is problematic. With lipreading, speech is easier to understand and separate from background noise. Being able to see the speech together with hearing devices makes a big difference in noisy situations.

The GW team has concluded that expert lipreaders have the ability to recognize a large number of words without knowing the context. Successful training in lipreading includes feedback on errors and should be generalizable – i.e. should lead to real-world benefits. The team is developing various protocols for training in lipreading, all of which are meant to build word recognition skills.

Dr. Auer said that this training is not yet available to the public because as a first step, all the data must be analyzed.

Part 2: Business meeting

Upcoming Conference on October 15th at the Marriott West Hotel:

This conference will take the place of a regular chapter meeting. It will be held in-person AND virtually, i.e. hybrid. The conference is sponsored by the Hearing Loss Association of America Twin Cities chapter in conjunction with the Minnesota Department of Human Services, Deaf and Hard of Hearing Services Division, and the University of Minnesota – Twin Cities.

Lionel Locke will be sending pamphlets for members to distribute to encourage participation. (Ade and Laura have already put out considerable efforts to publicize this wonderful event; others are encouraged to spread the word also!)

The focus of this conference is Introduction to Noise and Hearing, and prevention of noise-induced hearing loss in the loud workplace. Two audiologists from UMN will be speaking – a researcher and a clinician. Monique Hammond will also speak about protecting hearing in loud environments. Kristen Swan will discuss grief secondary to hearing loss.

Regarding setup – Lionel would appreciate setup help. Please email Lionel to discuss; (locke058@umn.edu). The doors are opening at 9:00 AM, but Lionel will be there earlier, around 7:30 AM. Ross plans to be there to help Lionel, but others surely would be welcome. It is unlikely that we will have vendors because of limited space. There will be a temporary loop in one part of the room.

Future HLAA-TC meetings will be virtual through the end of 2022. Meetings will be returning to hybrid as soon as we can make arrangements for technical and set-up volunteers at Courage Kenny. The meeting closed at 11:30 AM with a reminder for everyone to send in dues, as the fiscal year began September 1st. The meeting ended on a note of enthusiasm about the new Board and an acknowledgement of our gratitude to Christine, who will continue to give advice as needed and who has ensured that we have a stellar lineup of speakers for the year.

October 15, 2022 Hearing Conference By Laura Hagemann


October Book: "The Quality of Silence" with guest author Rosamund Lupton


